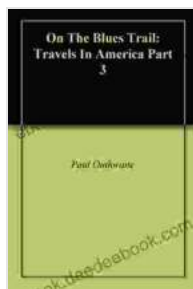


# On the Blues Trail: Travels in America Part 1

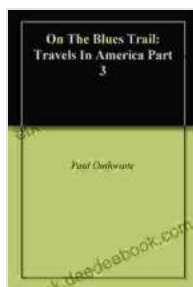

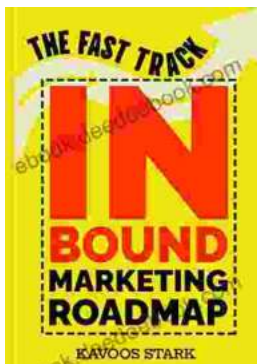
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
