Anatomy of a Tin Whistle:

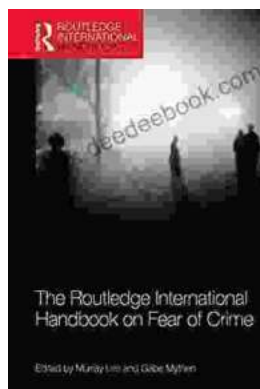

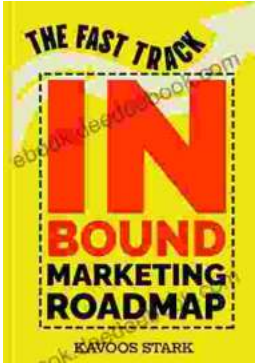
