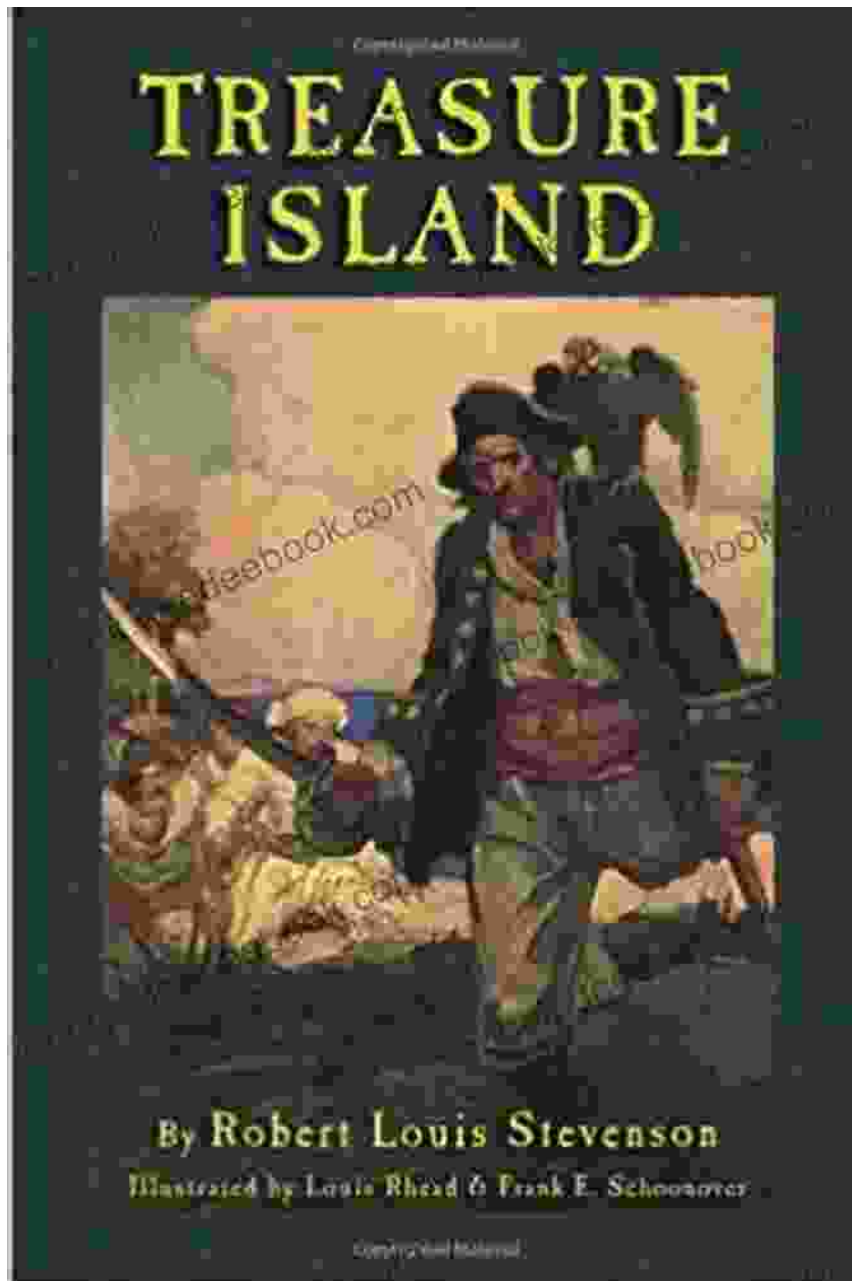

In a rather different way from the former, George II (1727 – 60), continued the Hanoverian rule. The Seven Year's war took place against France (1755-63), while England was gaining territories and expanding its power all over the world (Canada, Florida, America west of the Mississippi, etc). Overseas, the East India Company had established trading posts at Calcutta and Madras, and England, after fighting against French and Indian troops became the owner of the East India Company monopoly. 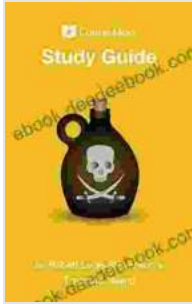

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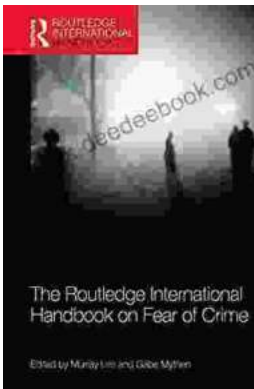
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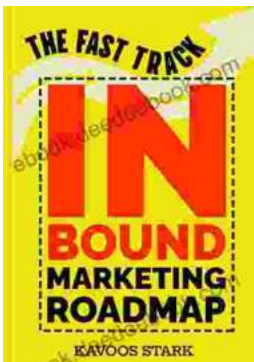
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
